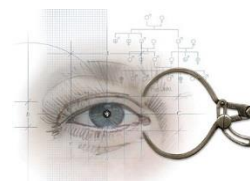

2017 Program Speaker Biographies

Stacy Gallin, DMH: Stacy Gallin, D.M.H., is the Founder and Director of the Maimonides Institute for Medicine, Ethics and the Holocaust. She earned her doctoral degree in Medical Humanities from Drew University in 2012, and subsequently taught courses on Bioethics and the Holocaust and Human Subject Research Ethics. Dr. Gallin founded MIMEH in 2015 as a way to transcend the generational, religious, geographical and professional boundaries in Holocaust education and protect the legacy of those whose lives were changed irrevocably by the horrendous events that took place during the Holocaust. Dr. Gallin has received grants for her work from several academic organizations, and has traveled throughout the world lecturing on this topic. She works closely with the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum, the Center for Medicine after the Holocaust and several other national and international organizations to raise awareness regarding the relevance of medicine, ethics and the Holocaust for modern medical practice, health policy and human rights endeavors.

Tessa Chelouche, MD: Tessa Chelouche, M.D, is a family physician. Originally from South Africa, Dr. Chelouche has lived in Israel for the past 38 years working as the director of a primary care family medical practice. Dr. Chelouche serves as Co-Director and Lecturer of a pre-graduate course on "The Study of Medicine and the Holocaust" for medical students at the Rappaport Faculty of Medicine, Technion Institute in Haifa, Israel for the past 13 years. She is the Co-Director of the Maimonides Institute for Medicine, Ethics and the Holocaust. She has published numerous articles on the subject of Medicine and the Holocaust including a "Casebook on Bioethics and the Holocaust" for the UNESCO Chair of Bioethics.

Susan M. Miller, MD, MPH, FACP is the John S. Dunn, Sr. Research Chair in General Internal Medicine at the Houston Methodist and is a Professor in the Department of Family Medicine and an Professor of Clinical Medicine at the Institute of Academic Medicine, Houston Methodist Research Institute. She is an Associate Professor, Weill Medical College, Cornell University. She is also the Deputy Chief in the Department of Family Medicine at The Methodist Hospital and an Associate Professor in the Center for Ethics and Health Policy, Baylor College of Medicine. Dr. Miller is currently the Chair of the Institutional Review Board of the Methodist Hospital Research Institute and is the Director of the Chao Program for International Research Ethics. Dr. Miller has provided consultation work to health care institutions in Central and Eastern Europe, Russia, Cameroon, the Philippines, South Korea, and Monterrey. She is a member of the board of directors for the Center for Medicine After the Holocaust (Houston), and is a co-founder of the Physicians after the Holocaust-Ukraine where she is also a member of the Scientific Council of the Informational Center of Bioethics - Ukraine. In addition, Dr. Miller is also a member of the Executive Advisory Board of CITI. Furthermore, Dr. Miller has an honorary faculty position at the Tomsk Regional Center for AIDS and Other Infectious Diseases in Tomsk, Siberia and is an Advisory Professor for the Catholic University of Korea.
