PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Public Administration degrees allow students to engage with communities in building their future. Specifically, we prioritize commitments to public and social issues, develop the capacity for organizations to help individuals reach their goals, and allow you to hone your own skills for leadership, management, collaboration, budgeting, and evaluation. Coursework explores the history and values of public service, while building real-world skills in areas such as managing people and resources, designing and evaluating programs, conducting human resources functions, collaborating with others and across sectors, making ethical decisions and communicating effectively in diverse environments. Major courses are offered primarily online, although students may complete non-major courses in-person, online, or through a combination of both. Students may also choose to earn one or more of the following certificates: Leadership, Equity, Advocacy and Policy, Strategic and Collaborative Management, and/or Public and Nonprofit Management. Highly qualified, eligible undergraduate students are provided with the unique opportunity to begin working on their Master of Public Administration or Master of Public Policy degree as an undergraduate in our Pathways BA/MPA or BA/MPP program.

How to schedule an advising appointment:

COURSEWORK THAT CAN BE COMPLETED AT PREVIOUS INSTITUTION

The following is a “bucket” of requirements students can complete prior to transferring to CU Denver, including equivalent Colorado Community College System (CCCS) courses. To determine the equivalencies of courses to be completed at non-CU Denver institutions, students can visit www.transferology.com. It is critical students connect with a CU Denver academic advisor to ensure planned courses will transfer and apply to CU Denver degree requirements. All non-CU Denver coursework must be completed with a C- or better to be eligible for transfer.

Students interested in completing an Associate (A.A. or A.S.) Degree or a [Colorado Statewide Transfer Articulation Agreement or Degree with Designation \(DWD\)](#) must work with their community/junior college academic advisor to create an academic plan that accounts for all degree or transfer articulation agreement requirements. Colorado Community College Students may also explore the option to complete [Reverse Transfer](#) at CU Denver.

SAMPLE PLAN – COURSEWORK TO BE COMPLETED AT CU DENVER

Based on successful completion of 60 applicable transfer credits and the complete “bucket” of requirements outlined above, students would have the following requirements remaining to complete at CU Denver. At CU Denver, students must tailor this plan based on the evaluation of previously completed college coursework (e.g., AP, IB, CLEP, dual/concurrent enrollment, and transfer credit), course availability, individual preferences related to course load, summer term courses, part-time or full-time student status, or add-on programs such as minors, certificates, or double-majors.

Note: this plan assumes students have completed the SPA Foreign Language proficiency requirement. Students who have not fulfilled this requirement must work with a CU Denver SPA Academic Advisor to modify this plan. (Students must demonstrate foreign language proficiency through a 2nd semester college-level course equivalent (e.g., SPA 1012 or ASL 1122), proficiency testing through CU Denver’s Department of Modern Languages, or submitting their high school transcript demonstrating completion of a 2nd year (Level II) high school course with a minimum grade of “C-” (1.7) in the 2nd semester of the 2nd year). Students are strongly encouraged to submit their high school transcripts during the admission process for quick evaluation of foreign language completed in high school.

This sample plan will adjust accordingly depending on what electives a student completed while at community college. Students will work directly with their academic advisor to determine how many general electives they have left once they are admitted to CU Denver. The number of general electives can also change depending on whether the students has completed the SPA Foreign Language requirement. While not required, students are encouraged to pursue a minor or certificate as a way to structure their general electives. Common minors include Business, Communication, English, Ethnic Studies, History, Human Development & Family Relations, Law Studies, Philosophy, Political Science, Psychology, Sociology, and Spanish. Students may complete none or many minors that fit within their remaining degree requirements.

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GENERAL PROGRAM AND GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS & POLICIES

The following program requirements are based on degree requirements for the current Catalog year at CU Denver and are subject to change. Students are responsible for completing degree requirements based on the Catalog year for which they are admitted.

All CU Denver Public Administration students are required to complete the following minimum general graduation requirements:

1. Complete a minimum of 120 semester hours.
2. Achieve a minimum 2.0 CU cumulative grade point average (GPA).
3. Complete all college and major requirements.
4. Residency: Complete a minimum of 30 hours in residence at CU Denver.
5. Terminal Residency: 21 out of the last 30 hours in residence at CU Denver.

Students are responsible for meeting with the academic advisor in their department to confirm major requirements. Students completing the Public Administration degree are required to complete the following minimum program requirements:

1. Complete 34-38 credit hours of CU Denver Core Curriculum coursework.
2. Complete 35-48 credit hours in general electives, which may include minor coursework (the number of general electives may vary).
3. Complete all PUAD major requirements, including PUAD 4939 Internship.
 - a. A letter grade of C- or better is required for all courses counted towards the PUAD major.
4. Complete a minimum 45 credit hours of upper-division (3000-level or above) coursework.
